Going digital has also opened up new opportunities for Tape Aids to assist more needy students under our *Talking e-Books* Education Outreach Programme.

Rivoni School was one of the first of the 23 Blind Schools in the country to benefit from Tape Aids' *Talking e-Books* Education Outreach programme launched in 2014. Providing human narrated audio versions of school text books and lessons in multiple mother tongue languages. English; Afrikaans; isiZulu; isiXhosa; Setswana and Sesotho.

Providing *Talking e-Books* paid off for pupils at Rivoni School for the Blind in Limpopo Province, with student Hlulani Malungani being one of the top-performing matric students in the country last year.
